With nice paths and wooden benches outside, it is the perfect spot to relax or have fruit break!


Hopefully we'll be there soon!

Coral Bleaching

Ingredients:

- 125g unsalted butter, chopped.
- 125g cadbury baking dark chocolate, chopped.
- 3 eggs, lightly whisked.
- 335g (1 ½ cups) white sugar.
- 115 (3/4 cups) plain flour.
- 30g (1/4 cups) cocoa powder)
- 1 tsp vanilla extract.
- Pinch of salt.

Method:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C/ 160C fan force. Grease a 20cm (base measurement) square cake pan and line with baking paper.
- 2. Place butter and chocolate in a heatproof bowl over a saucepan of simmering water (don't let the bowl touch the water). Stir with a metal spoon until melted. Remove from heat. Quickly stir in eggs, sugar, flour, cocoa powder, vanilla and salt until just combined.
- 3. Pour into the prepared pan. Bake for 30 minutes or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out with moist crumbs clinging to it. Set aside to cool completely.

Enjoy your sweet treat.

Did you know coral gets its colours from the algae that lives inside of the coral? The algae feeds the coral and gives it most of the energy it needs to survive. When the water gets too warm and stays warm for too long the coral gets stressed and rejects the algae, then the coral loses its colour and starts to go paler and whiter. If the water goes back to its normal temperature then the algae can return to the coral but if the water stays warm for too long the coral will die.

- -Be conscious when buying aquarium fish. Try not to purchase live coral, and if you buy a marine aquarium fish, make sure that it has been collected in a safe manner.
- Don't touch the coral when you go scuba diving or snorkelling. Remember, coral reefs are alive.
- -Don't pollute. Don't put garbage or human waste in the water and don't leave rubbish lying around on the beach.
- -Volunteer. Community coral reef monitoring programs are very important. Since we do not live at the coast, we could get involved in a local save the river program.

The designated colour representing Harmony Day is orange, a colour that symbolises peace and diversity in society.


